Hungary and Ukraine Discovering the Love of God and Helping the Roma

This October, I helped lead a team of eight people to Hungary and Ukraine in order to further develop our partnership with the Reformed Churches of Hungary and Ukraine in their outreach efforts to the Roma or Gypsy people. For the past eight years, I have been involved in Roma ministries in Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union. The Roma have a complicated history, and it is wonderful and miraculous when they come to Christ. During this last trip, I was reminded what one pastor of the Reformed Church of Hungary said to me long ago. He said, "Some of us Hungarian Christians want very much to extend the love of Christ to these highly discriminated against people, the Roma, but if the truth be known we in the Reformed Church were so beaten-up, beleaguered and pushed down under communism that we are barely psychologically whole ourselves."
